

Summer in the City

"What happens in Vegas stays in Vegas," goes the popular marketing maxim. But if your image of Sin City still revolves around the era when Sinatra's Rat Pack roamed, much has changed. Las Vegas is now a cosmopolitan city (pop. two million) with something for everyone, from Broadway shows to country-music honky-tonks, auto racing to world-class fashion boutiques. And the town once known for \$2.99 steak-and-shrimp specials has become an internationally recognized culinary destination.

Overview

Obviously, the gargantuan gaming resorts of the Strip (technically, Las Vegas Boulevard So.) are the main draw in Las Vegas, as well as the smaller casinos around downtown's Fremont Street Experience. But the Vegas valley also offers a number of natural and man-made attractions, from Hoover Dam (also known by its original name, Boulder Dam) to Red Rock Canyon; even the Grand Canyon is just a day trip away.

There is so much to do in Las Vegas that if you don't plan ahead, you can quickly get overwhelmed and miss the best it has to offer—or worse, take the guidance of certain locally printed guides that play favorites and offer less-than-unbiased reviews.

Weather

Though it might be easy to forget with all the impressive landscaping in and around the resorts, Las Vegas is in the Mojave Desert. While the climate changes here more than most might expect, in the summer months it is very hot and very dry, with average highs of 105 degrees Fahrenheit (and only lows of 78 degrees overnight). You'll see a lot of people walking the Strip with huge frozen

alcohol drinks, but carrying water might be a better idea (many valets have free bottles if you ask). And don't forget sunscreen, even if you don't expect to be outdoors much.

Getting Around

A chief complaint of Vegas visitors is the deceiving distance between the resorts; walking farther than the next one over is definitely ill-advised, especially in summer (it's 4.4 miles between the Stratosphere resort on the North end and Mandalay Bay on the South). Your best bet is a \$7 day pass on The Deuce, Las Vegas' double-decker bus line that runs 24/7 up and down the Strip, to downtown's Fremont Street and other points. There are also free trams between various resorts, plus the Monorail.

Flights to Las Vegas arrive at McCarran International Airport (LAS). Ask ahead if your resort offers a shuttle service (many do now), or try any of several reliable airport shuttle services that charge less than \$10 each direction.

Las Vegas cabs tend to be expensive and can eat up much of your travel budget. If you do decide on taking a cab, don't try to hail one on the street (most aren't allowed to pick you up on the curb)—go to a taxi line at a resort.

Palazzo offers not only the Paiza level for VIP gamblers, but also the Prestige level, certainly the nicest generally available concierge club on the Strip.

The non-gaming property within City Center is relatively limited (though adjacent to plenty of gaming and other amenities), but the elements inside—restaurants Twist by Pierre Gagnaire and MOzen, the Sky Lobby Lounge, the tearoom, and the spa—are among the city's very best.

In previous times, this '50s-era resort would have been slated for demolition. Instead, the property's new owners decided to remake its "good bones" to evoke the Trop's original Havana/Miami theme, so far bringing rooms and the pool up to a virtual four-star level. But while the casino rehab is still under way, accommodations are available at bargain rates. It's definitely the deal of the season (second choice: Gold Spike, also newly remodeled).

While several Strip hotels such as Mandalay Bay, Excalibur, Circus Circus, and Flamingo offer kid-friendly amenities like wave pools, carnival-style midways, multiplex theaters, and video arcades, the off-Strip, non-gaming Loews resort on Lake Las Vegas is the definitive family destination. With a secured beach, watercrafts, a pool slide, a kids' club, sushi-making classes, and free movies on the lake, Loews, while maintaining grown-up comfort and style, offers a vacation your kids will never want to end.

Located between the Encore and Sahara resorts, this HGV (the best of three in Vegas) is a "vacation ownership" property that's also a traditional hotel. One-bedroom suites offer a full kitchen, a dining area, a flatscreen TV with Bose DVD system, a pullout sleeper couch, a soaking tub open to the bedroom, soft bedding, and Crabtree & Evelyn bath products. The property offers a great pool area, a cozy spa, a 24-hour fitness room, a business center, a lounge (with Ping-Pong, pool, foosball, and a huge TV), and even a mini-mart (open 5 a.m. to 1 a.m.).

Best Off-Strip Neighborhood Stays

DOWNTOWN/FREMONT STREET

Most of the casinos around Vegas' original gaming center, Fremont Street (now a pedestrian mall canopied by a massive ever-changing video lightshow), are finding ways to spruce up. The Golden Nugget, downtown's only four-star resort-with a one-of-a-kind shark-tank pool deck-found space to squeeze in a whole new state-of-the-art tower. Downtown's arts corridor and emerging funky bar scene add to its alternative allure.

SUMMERLIN

This master-planned upscale community to the west of the Strip abuts Red Rock Canyon, a national conservation area holding a variety of natural and prehistoric treasures. The retro-modern Red Rock Casino Resort offers much for visitors and locals alike, including restaurants, a solid spa, and entertainment plus bowling and cinemas. A more traditional destination resort, JW Marriott Las Vegas Resort & Spa-adjacent to two courses-is a magnet for golfers and has the locals-beloved Rampart Casino's Carmel Room steakhouse.

As Vegas' other growing "suburb," and gateway to Lake Mead and Hoover Dam, Henderson has many of its own destination restaurants, day spas, and recreational activities. Ultra-mod M Resort sports a chic spa, a category-killer cellar wine bar, an astounding buffet, and frequent poolside concerts.

Even the bathrooms will impress.

Of the several places on the Strip for a romantic cocktail with a view, Mandarin Oriental's 23rd-floor Sky Lobby is by far the best. Settle in for a subdued, chic retreat with 180 degrees of floor-to-ceiling windows, plush seating, creative cocktails, and refined service.

With the new Joint at Hard Rock, the Pearl at Palms, and arenas at MGM Grand, Mandalay Bay, and The Orleans, Las Vegas is now a prime place to see a live show. But the best venue may turn out to be Rio's new Crown Theater. Formerly Prince's resident 3121 club, The Crown is a 900-person-capacity, no-bad-seat circular room with upgraded sound, video projection, go-go dancers, and tiers of VIP booths hosted by lingerie-clad waitresses.

XS (Encore)

When it comes to the Vegas club scene, almost all agree that the semi-circular, indoor-outdoor superclub aptly named XS ("Excess," get it?) dominates. This plush party pad isn't for lowrollers, but it promises an unforgettable experience. (Also popular with locals: Thursdays at TAO and Sundays at The Bank.)

BB King's Blues Club (The Mirage)

Casino lounges are a venerated essential of the Vegas experience, offering solid entertainment and drinks in a comfortable environment. But recently they've fallen on hard times, often featuring soulless cover bands or uncreative DJs. BB King's new juke-joint-inspired club isn't a lounge per se, but it functions exactly as one should, offering solid cover-free entertainment to which to drink and dance. The food's not bad, either. (Another popular spot is the Dueling Pianos Show At Harrah's.)

Best Day Life

Vegas being a 24-hour town, its nightlife culture has bled from after-hours events (the current hot one is at Aria's Gold Lounge) into daytime DJ-ed pool parties. Nearly every resort has one, but all are not created equal. Here's a brief on what to expect where.

Encore Pool Club (Encore)

A whimsically lavish escape with outdoor gaming, two floors of plush cabanas, and dance pads in the pool.

Bare (The Mirage)

One of the more intimate party pools, this topless-optional retreat culls VIPs and local models as a matter of course.

Azure (The Palazzo)

One of the more intricate, and mature, private pools, with multiple plunges, large Jacuzzis, and excellent food from Wolfgang Puck's Solara.

Tao Beach (The Venetian)

A sautée pan of sweat and sin, this number-one club is reliably stacked with sensuality.

Liquid (Aria)

The roomier, elegant sister to Bare promises a similar energy level with a slightly higher sense of self. Good food.

Rehab Sundays/Sky Bar (Hard Rock Hotel)

The mother of all Vegas pool parties, and its new stylish spinoff.

Wet Republic (MGM Grand)

There are hard bodies, and plenty of them. Two saltwater pools are stuffed with party people, and it's frequently celebrity-hosted.

The Hideout (Golden Nugget)

Aptly named, downtown's only adult pool is accessible only to those in the know—a small but rewarding respite.

Go Pool (Flamingo)

Attitude-free, European-style topless-optional pool with games and low-pressure fun.

Ditch Fridays (Palms)


A bonanza of beautiful people, both local and Los Angeleno.


